FROM THE ASSISTANT PASTOR'S DESK

Just over two weeks ago, when hurricane Matthew pummeled the east coast, Barb and I had a personal interest in the track of the storm, as our son, Scott, lives in Raleigh, North Carolina. Fortunately for him, the storm stayed just far enough east of Raleigh that they were spared the worst of the damage, though there was extensive flooding and wind damage where he lives. His own residence was spared any significant damage, except for a couple of lost shingles on the roof. It seemed like he had dodged a bullet. But a couple of days later, the drywall in the ceiling began to turn color, evidence that water had gotten in where the shingles were missing. It took some time for the water to find the lowest point in the attic to pool in, and then some additional time for the water to soak through the drywall and reveal the damage that had been done. While it is by no means a disaster, drywall repair can be messy and expensive, especially in areas of vaulted and elevated ceilings, where his occurred. Just a little external damage, but a messy job to repair.

Life is often like that. A seemingly little event, yet the destruction it causes seems far out of proportion to the event itself. Nowhere is this more true than in the words we speak. Words spoken in anger are often intended to win an argument, or to hurt the one to whom they are spoken. But often the damage they do to the one they are spoken to are far deeper than intended, and the evidence of that

damage may not surface for a long time, though damage is still occurring all the while.

The Bible speaks much about our speech, our words to others, whether they are hurtful or comforting. The book of James, chapter 5, especially,


speaks of the damage that is done by what often seem to us merely words, but are more damaging than physical violence. And the book of Proverbs says this: "There is one whose rash words are like sword thrusts, but the tongue of the wise brings healing." (Prov. 12:13). Our world, our nation, our communities, our



homes and our church need healing. And in every case, the healing ultimately is needed because of words spoken like sword thrusts, rather than words of comfort. As individuals, we may not be able to do much to heal our nation or our communities, but we can bring healing to our homes and to our church family, if there is any hurt within our body. It will not happen until we speak words of healing, love and reconciliation to one another. Now would be a good time.




Gratitude Gift - A Christmas Offering

SESSION NOTES

From the September 22, 2016 meeting:

- 1) Marie and Chris Schroeder joined the Church by Reaffirmation of Faith on September 18, 2016.
- 2) Thank you for responding to Pastor Tim's appeal to erase our deficit. Many members have caught up their pledges and others have given an extra offering.
- 3) A part-time position of Children's Ministry Director was approved, and Jenny McCleary was hired as the interim director.
- 4) Assistant Pastor Jerry Brundle will continue to serve as the interim pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Anna, Illinois through December 31st.
- 5) Thank you to those who are helping fulfill our pledge to feed **80** children three meals/day for a year at a cost of \$1300/month in our adopted orphanage in Kenya.
- 6) \$9,035 is in The Reverend Dr. James Quillin Memorial Fund, established for the purpose of purchasing a new church sign. The goal is \$20,000.
- 7) Debt Reduction Campaign receipts through September 22nd were \$152,638, which is 61% of the goal of \$250,000.
- 8) Through September 22nd, General Operating Fund receipts were \$289,761 and expenses were \$305,521 for a deficit of \$15,760. The reserve checking account balance is \$57,564.
