Lunch on Thanksgiving at my house was a day filled with food, family and gratitude. One of our traditions is for every family member to share something he or she is thankful for before we pray and eat. "Give thanks to the Lord and praise His name" (Psalm 100:4). One of my Millennial cousins was particularly poignant. He said

he was thankful that our family continues the tradition of gathering together for a meal and fellowship at Thanksgiving and Christmas, because a lot of his friends' families don't anymore.


The last day to bring filled bottles is January 6th.

- 4) Beginning November 4th, Sue Armour and Don Forte will begin teaching a new **Pre-School Sunday School Class.**
- 5) All remaining details for the **new Church sign** have been finished, and installation is scheduled for the first week in December.

- 8) **Debt Reduction Campaign** receipts through October 25th were \$173,482, which is 69% of the goal of \$250,000.
- 9) **General Fund** income through September 30th was \$318,109 and expenses were \$343,763 for a shortage of \$25,654. The reserve checking account balance is currently \$32,391.
